A Proposal for 100+ Men Who Care South Dundas in support of Wheels of Hope

This year, over 200,000 Canadians will be newly diagnosed with cancer. They will range in age from birth into their most senior years. In recent news (June 2017) new statistics revealed that approximately 1 in 2 Canadians will be diagnosed with cancer in their lifetime, and it will be cancer of all types.

Once diagnosed, 1 in 5 of these cancer patients will struggle to make it to their cancer treatments.

Together, we can ensure that every resident across the South Dundas region living with cancer has the support they need. They will reach their cancer treatments safely and with comfort, dignity, and with far more peace of mind than public transportation or a taxi can offer.

Wheels of Hope: An Essential Lifeline

The stress of a cancer diagnosis and the life upheaval it brings, is already enough. We have found that one fifth of these patients have an added pressure of sourcing ways to get to and from their treatments that could continue for years. For these patients and their families, this service is quite literally, a lifeline. Over the years, our program has been affectionately dubbed *Wheels of Hope*.


The need for Wheels of Hope continues to grow. In fact, the SDG & Prescott unit sees dozens of new clients each and every month. On any given work day, we have **half a dozen volunteer drivers** on the road providing **rides daily** to patients from our region who need to travel to treatment.

The average cost in SDG & Prescott Russell for transporting a patient to one treatment is \$67.00. Typically, treatment will last seven weeks, requiring a minimum of 14 trips to treatment at a cost of \$938.00 for the

rides alone. We are proud to say that, annual we drive thousands of kilometers at NO COST (other than a registration fee), to our cancer patients and their escorts for these vital trips.

Our Need is Growing

The number of new cancer cases in Canada is expected to rise by about 40% in the next 15 years. Canada's aging population is a major factor in this anticipated increase in disease: our baby boomer population is turning 65 between now and 2031.

Not surprisingly, demand for Wheels of Hope is already on the rise and this pressure will continue to increase. We urgently need donor support if we are to maintain this much-needed service across South Dundas. With only 1 driver, there is currently a tremendous need for us to recruit additional volunteers in order to be able to service the community.
